From the RECTOR



SUMMER FEELS ODD THIS YEAR.

In a normal year, once we get past Memorial Day, life slows down somewhat, as people ease into summer mode. This year, however, because of improved conditions with the pandemic, many people who have been somewhat dormant are now excited about picking up the pace and returning to more active lives.

As we look ahead to the summer months, we'll continue to worship regularly on Sundays. I hope you'll come to church when you can, and if you're out of town, remember that you can worship with via the livestream of the 11 am service, which we plan to continue indefinitely. Andrea Thompson, our Director of Communications and Marketing, is looking at some options for upgrading our cameras later this year, which should enhance the livestream experience greatly.

Throughout the summer we'll also have plenty of opportunities for people of all ages to gather to enjoy fun and fellowship together. This issue of *Tidings* highlights several of those activities.

Additionally, here are some things that will occupy our energies this summer:

RESPONSE TO THE PANDEMIC.

The Vestry has examined conditions regularly since the beginning of the pandemic, authorizing changes when the time has seemed right. The latest changes took effect at the beginning of June, with the biggest change being the allowance of fully vaccinated people to go without masks inside the church buildings. As we continue to see improvements in our conditions, the vestry will consider further revisions to our Covid protocols. A lot of the improvements are due to people getting their Covid vaccines, so if you're eligible and if you haven't yet done so, let me encourage you to get your vaccine. In the meantime, if you're not yet vaccinated, we expect you to continue wearing a mask indoors here at St. Luke's; if you're experiencing

Covid-like symptoms, we hope you'll stay at home; and we encourage you to respect those who prefer to maintain social distancing at this time.

Staff members are working with representatives from various church groups to discuss how they might migrate back to the church after having been meeting remotely for the past year.

THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN.

The response to our campaign, "Transformation and Celebration", continues to be strong. We have received commitments of almost \$1.95 million. We are so close to our goal of \$2 million! If you have not yet made a commitment, there's still time. And if you feel inspired to increase your commitment, to help us cross the finish line, we'd love for you to let us know.

The first big project is the new pipe organ. The Reuter Organ Company continues to make great progress building the organ at their facility in Lawrence, KS. We're doing site work on our end, to get the Organ Loft ready for the organ installation, which should happen in just a few months.

Later this year we'll plan to turn our attention to the other components of the campaign: the restoration of the church's stained glass windows, the updating of the Parlor, the landscaping and exterior improvements, and the HVAC and infrastructure needs.

PLANNING FOR THE 2021-22 PROGRAM YEAR.

Summer is a great time to plan for the future. We've already got plans for classes for adults in the fall, and we're excited about the All-Parish Retreat, a weekend for people of all ages at Camp Capers the first weekend of October. We're working on other things too, so that St. Luke's can continue to thrive as we energize ourselves for our mission of illuminating San Antonio with the Light of Christ.

Mary Dixon's 2020 Spring Break plans came to an abrupt halt with an early morning call from her mother. The US was closing the borders to help stop the spread of Covid-19 and they had 24 hours to get home. Dr. Dixon, a Distinguished Senior Lecturer at UTSA, her husband, and two children were in Amsterdam for Spring Break scrambled to find a flight back to the US.

She started seeing stories asking for volunteers for the Pfizer vaccine trials happening in San Antonio and she jumped at the chance to do something, other than just staying at home. "It's one of those moments where you think, If not me then who? Who's supposed to do it?"

She weighed the pros and cons and there wasn't a good reason not to do it; no health conditions that put her at greater risk, and she'd never had a bad reaction to vaccines. She's a healthy middle-aged person and so she filled out the application.

It had been two months since Dr. Dixon filled out her application for the vaccine trial and as we collectively eased into curbside and carry out life, she was still waiting to be called. Two days before the trial began her phone rang and she picked the first available time and became patient 001 of the Pfizer vaccine trials in San Antonio.

Ten hours after the second shot she suspected she was in the vaccine group and not the placebo. "Instinctively when you have chills, fever, dry mouth you know something is going on. I couldn't get warm. I had on extra layers of clothes, in the middle of summer, I was freezing." Her suspicions were confirmed when her group was unblind-

ed in January of this year, six months after the trial began.

Because of existing RNA technology, the vaccines for Covid-19 were able to be developed in record time. The trials were a giant success but last year this was an unknown risk, it wasn't guaranteed that the vaccine would be effective or safe. "Once you know you have the vaccine that's where faith really kicks in. That's what we prayed for every day. Lord keep us safe, keep us healthy, and keep my mother healthy."

One of the joyful side effects of the vaccine was being able to share her experiences to give people around her confidence in the vaccine. She felt called to connect with people on Twitter,

on Facebook, in the media to let people know it's ok to be scared but you know someone who's been through this trial. You can ask me questions to help you feel more confident when you get your turn.

God puts opportunities in your path and for Dr. Dixon taking part in the vaccine trials has allowed her to be a voice for people that don't have faith in the science behind the vaccine. She's been able to be the voice for faith and science. "You have faith in the Lord that He has sent us the vaccine and He's giving you the opportunity to protect yourself and your family but you to take advantage of it. Science and faith are one - the Lord has given you the knowledge to make life safer and easier but you have to grab it when it comes to you."

I decided to be confirmed to become closer to Christ. This journey guided me to my path for the rest of my life and gave me an opportunity to learn more about my beliefs.


HANNAH KETCHUM

GREETERS

Greeters welcome visitors into our doors, make them feel welcome, help them find a seat, introduce them to parishioners and the clergy, invite them to St. Luke's programs and events, and invite them back again.

MUSTARD SEED

HEALTHY CHILD CARE TEXAS - SOCIAL EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Mustard Seed was selected as one of fifty schools to participate in the Healthy Child Care Texas – Social Emotional Development (HCCT-SED) Project funded by the Texas Association for the Education of Young Children (TXAEYC). The goal of the HCCT-SED Project is to increase the number of children receiving developmental screening in child care programs for children ages 0 to 5. This age range is a critical period of child development and a child's success in school increases the sooner they receive early intervention services.

The Mustard Seed staff attended a 6-hour child development training led by Child Care Health Consul-

tant, Dr. LuzDalia Sanchez, where they learned how to use and administer the Ages and Stages Questionnaires "ASQ". The ASQ's are a children's developmental and social-emotional screening tool, which helps to identify a child's areas of strength and areas to foster growth. The ASQ's are a collaboration with parents to unlock critical knowledge of their child's development, enabling teachers to plan developmentally appropriate activities for each of their students.

The Mustard Seed was honored to be a part of the statewide initiative to improve outcomes for all children and families in Texas by giving children the best start in life.


WHAT IS A PILGRIMAGE?

A pilgrimage is a journey that holds religious significance. Christians have been going on pilgrimages since the beginning of the church. Walking to and near places that tell a part of our faith story has been a sacred way to celebrate and deepen spiritual lives throughout history. One of the most famous pilgrimages is the Camino de Santiago in Spain. Every year thousands of pilgrims travel to the Holy Land, Rome, Iona in Scotland, and other significant sites of Christianity. These journeys are a way to deepen our connection with God, feel connected to Christians around the world, and to experience prayer through walking and the use of our bodies.

WHAT IS UNIQUE ABOUT THIS PILGRIMAGE?

This pilgrimage is unique in three ways. First, this is a virtual pilgrimage. We will not physically be traveling to the locations we'll be talking about. Instead, pilgrims will be submitting their steps each week, and collectively we will walk our journey together. Second, this is a local pilgrimage. We will be virtually journeying through the span of the Diocese of West Texas. We begin in San Antonio, make a large and spiraling loop through each city with an Episcopal church, and complete the trip back in San Antonio. Third, the theme of this pilgrimage is racial reconciliation. At each stop we will pray for wisdom and God's presence to be with us on our travels, but also for reconciliation. We will read a cultural story from history that has not often been told, and reflect on ways that we can better strive for justice and peace to see the image of God in all persons, and respect the dignity of every human being.

We will be collectively walking the span of our diocese this Summer. It's roughly 2,000 miles or about 4,000,000 steps. We will be adding all our steps together to make the journey. Along the way we will "stop" in each city with an Episcopal Church. While in that city we will learn about a story of racial justice or injustice that took place in the area. This is one small way that we can acknowledge our nation's historic struggle with racial equality and a small step towards reconciliation for our nation.



Each week in your email inbox you will receive:

- An update on where we are in the diocese
- Stories of racial injustice or cultural significance from the area
- Prayers for pilgrims and for racial reconciliation
- Journal prompts to use at your leisure
- A Google form link to send in your steps/miles taken

Once registered you can also come to the church to pick up your pilgrimage packet which includes:

- A holding cross to carry as you walk your steps
- A journal for notes and reflections during the journey
- Prayers for pilgrimage and more

MUSICAL MATTERS

In her online article [Quantum Music](#), Katie McCormick addresses music in a way connected to quantum mechanics. She also draws on Pythagoras and Galileo. But the subtitle: What if dissonance yields better results? is key. In my own terms, all things have vibrations, waves or harmonics; these are absolutely natural to everything.

Pythagoras realized the scale cannot be broken into 12 or thirteen (a repeat of 1) equal parts. Octaves should meet and the fourth and fifth should be perfect, but then everything else falls apart. Bach had this problem (thus writing his Well-Tempered Clavier) and any music before the baroque period had to favor certain keys in order to be playable, or to be listenable. The unacceptable keys were said to have a “wolf” because the dissonance “howled,” and Bach would purposely play in these keys to encourage mathematicians and tuners to devise a more universal tuning method. As science progressed they were able to break down the 12 (13) notes into perfectly divided pitches, which meant every single interval was impure and wrong, and we became inured to it. You hear the greatest concert pianists playing on a piano that is purposely totally out of tune, but our ears accept it. Now, when we hear pure tonalities we think it sounds sour.

If we tune a system based on perfect fifths (which is how we tune) C to G, then G to D, etc., we eventually get back to the original C (13) but that C 13 is wildly

out of tune with the original C thus proving perfection is not real, and dissonance is perfect. To make it fit (beat it into submission) each interval has to be drawn in by a fiftieth (doesn't sound much) to make the Cs meet.

Enter Galileo. Until recent times the Church refused to embrace science. The world was flat, and Earth was the center of the Universe. Around 1582 the Church


had no choice but to flip from the Julian Calendar (named after Julius Caesar) to the Gregorian Calendar – the Eastern Orthodox are still unhappy about it. Galileo could tell from his study of the Solar System that something was off, and it was big leap for Pope Gregory XIII to make this change. However, it took until 1992 for the Vatican to acknowledge Galileo was correct all along! Nevertheless, even now the day isn't exactly 24 hours long (it's 24 hours and 26 seconds) and every four years we need to make an adjustment – the leap year.

In recent times, with the advent of nuclear microscopy, we have learned that fractal patterns constantly evolve but never end. The closer you get, the more the pattern develops. This is the same with the harmonic series and the universe. There may be a beginning but there's certainly no end. It could be a simile for the Christian Life.
