LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

I love talking with visitors and hearing their first impressions of St. Luke's Church. People who are new to the Episcopal Church, maybe with backgrounds in large evangelical churches, often say how much they appreciate how small St. Luke's is, with an intimate and familial quality that they appreciate. People with experience in other Episcopal churches, however, notice how big and busy we are compared to the other churches they've experienced.

It's true that we are one of the larger Episcopal churches in the Diocese of West Texas. We've got resources available to us that other congregations don't have. But it's also true that if you look beyond the Episcopal Church, you'll find many faith communities that operate on a much larger scale than we do, with resources to minister in ways that we couldn't even imagine.

I like to think that St. Luke's is just the right size for the mission that God gives us right now. As a clergy colleague remarked recently, we're a church with "a lot of moving parts". As a church with four weekly services, we have busy, complex Sundays week in and week out. We have many distinct communities within the congregation, from the various worship ministry groups to the young adults group and the Green Door volunteers and the network of families with children at St. Luke's Episcopal School.

As you'll see from this issue of Tidings, there's lots going on at St. Luke's these days. I continue to hope for St. Luke's to be a place where people gather to worship the Lord, and then they can nurture connections and relationships with one another, and then we can partner together minister in God's name in the world around us. The task of church leadership – vestry, clergy, staff, heads of ministry groups – is to be faithful in making good use of the resources available to us. I hope you'll find lots in *Tidings* to get you excited, and if you have ideas for new programs or ministries or offerings, I'd love to visit with you.

Special Events

Wednesdays in Lent: Traveling through the Book of Acts

This year we will be combining with three other local Episcopal churches for our Lenten programming. Each Wednesday we will travel to a different church, eat dinner together, hear a presentation on the book of Acts from a variety of clergy, and engage in conversation and discussion. Churches participating this year are St. Luke's, St. David's, St. Margaret's, and St. Paul's. Watch for more details in your 5 Things and announcements for dates, locations, and times. We look forward to having you join us with our Episcopal neighbors around San Antonio as we learn and grow together!

Stations of the Resurrection: Sat., April 6

Join us for our third annual Stations of the Resurrection, a walking meditation on the post resurrection stories of Jesus. Similar to Stations of the Cross, Stations of the Resurrection give us time to reflect on the wonder, beauty, and joy of Easter. At each station a portion of scripture is read about Jesus' resurrection, prayers are said, and we meditate on beautiful artwork that goes along with the story. This year's stations will take place on April 6 at the Bishop Jones Center. The stations conclude with Eucharist and a shared lunch. This would be an especially wonderful event for those who will be confirmed or received by Bpishop Read the following day at St. Luke's.

Theology Think Tank: Thursday, February 8

Join co-facilitators James Gomez and Reagan Gonzalez as we explore topics of faith, theology, and the church from a stance of curiosity. We plan for this monthly event to give folks the opportunity to explore themes and topics of Christianity through questions, perhaps that you haven't felt comfortable asking in church or Sunday school before. We'll take questions ahead of time, and then walking with a variety of theologians throughout time, we'll discuss what God might be saying to us today. All theologies and perspectives are welcome for respectful conversation about our God who is beyond fully understanding.

Sunday Mornings

Gospel of Mark: January 7-31

Join us for this introduction and overview of Mark, the gospel we will primarily hear proclaimed and preached on in worship during 2024. Plots, character development, historical context, and what the Holy Spirit is saying to us today are all a part of what we'll be learning together.

Spring Inquirer's Class: Feb. 4 - March 24

New to St. Luke's? Want to learn more about the Episcopal Church? Desire to be confirmed by Bishop David G. Read when he visits St. Luke's in April? Join us for our Spring Inquirer's Class on Sundays February 4 through March 24 during the 10:00 am formation hour to learn more about our community and the whole church. Exploring the Apocrypha: Feb. 4 - March 24

Join Fr. Irv in exploring the Apocrypha, a collection of books written in the four centuries between the Old and New Testaments. Many protestant Bibles omit the Apocrypha completely, but some versions place the Apocrypha in between the Old and New Testaments. Though the Apocrypha is not Scripture, many Protestants (including Luther, Calvin, and other Reformers) have found the collection useful historically, theologically, and spiritually. 

Council in Action



It's our custom for each Diocesan Council to gather supplies in support of a local agency doing the Lord's work in their own context. This year's Council is supporting Good Samaritan Community Services ("Good Sam"), a diocesan ministry based in west San Antonio serving the community in many ways. Through our Council in Action efforts, we'll be collecting supplies that Good Sam will distribute to the families they serve. If you'd like to support the effort, you could purchase the following items and bring them to church. Then our delegates will take them to San Marcos and make them available to Good Sam:

- Infant shoes (sneakers) and socks from size 1-12
- Youth shoes (sneakers) and socks from size 1-12 and adult sizes from 8-12 for older youth

• Hoodies/sweaters for infants up to age five, children from age 5 through 18, and some adult sizes.

As always, our framework of plans and our approach is on our webpage, but I'll highlight some plans that are in the works for the next few months that are hopefully helping support families in their spiritual journey.

GenOn Christian Parenting Project

Some of us on our DWTX Christian Formation Committee have been participating in a newly launched "pilot project for churches longing to connect in meaningful ways with families. These 108 churches, and the families in them, will test and give feedback on resources that support parents/grandparents/ caregivers, kids, and the connection between homes and churches. We are embarking on a mutual journey to find where God is leading us in our current contexts with the real felt needs of today's families."

The leaders of GenOn have hosted terrific online workshops featuring leaders in topics such as understanding family systems, supporting families by having a trauma-informed ministry, and developing our relationships and plans rooted in empathy and deep listening to the people we seek to serve. MUSIC AT ST. LUKE'S

Happy New Year! As of this writing, we haven't yet celebrated Christmas, but I want to thank the choir for a job well done at our *Messiah* concert, and for a large and appreciative audience who made it all worthwhile.

Epiphany season is pretty short this year, but we have some great repertoire coming up, such as the French traditional carol *Quelle est c'est odeur*, ("Whence is that goodly fragrance"), *Kelly in C* evening canticles, and Palestrina's amazing *Surge illuminare*. Their titles probably mean little, but I hope they'll still be inspiring and convey their beauty.

Then we get into probably the richest of all seasons: Lent and Easter. Lent begins with *Allegri's Miserere* on Ash Wednesday, that remarkably poignant rendition of Psalm 51; we add Pablo Casals' *O vos omnes* to the choral repertoire; and on Good Friday we sing the Duruflé *Requiem* at 7:00 pm in the evening. Maurice Duruflé is a French post-romantic composer who modeled his requiem on the famous one by Gabriel Fauré. This music is intensely emotional, as you'd expect mourning someone you loved, and in this case we sing it as Christ dies on the Cross. We invite you to grieve for Christ as he is laid in the tomb, and we welcome you to bring your memories of those you loved and offer them for safe keeping in heaven.

Ralph Vaughan Williams wrote a set of anthems called *Five Mystical Songs* and we have sung several of them. We add another to the choir library: *Rise heart, thy joy is risen!* A rapturous outpouring of the news that Jesus is no longer dead, but fully alive. And at the end of choir term and the liturgical year we have two new pieces for our Evensong on Pentecost: the evening canticles *Stainer in B flat* and Hagenberg's *When we love*. The text has great meaning for the times we live in – "When we love, simply love, even as we are loved, our weary world can be transformed." Be part of that transformation!

As a ministry of St. Luke's Church, The Green Door touches lives in a multitude of ways and one of the most profound is in the ability to financially assist non-profit organizations engaged in charitable and humanitarian efforts. One hundred percent of the net proceeds from the sales at the Shop is awarded annually in grants. Each year the amount available for these grants has increased such that for 2023 that total was \$135,000!

What has also increased each year is the number of organizations applying for grants. This year a total of 47 organizations applied for and received grants, 11 of which submitted requests for the very first time, so the word is spreading about The Green Door!

Organizations impacted by these grants involved areas such as Hunger and Shelter Relief, Substance Abuse, Nutrition awareness, Education, Children and Teens, the Elderly, and Special Needs and extended from as nearby as the West side of San Antonio to as far away as Honduras and Uganda. What an incredible reach, all of which is entirely due to the devoted work of The Green Door volunteers and staff and is done on behalf of St. Luke's Church, thus making The Green Door a major outreach arm of this church!

The Mustard Seed is a ministry of St. Luke's Episcopal Church for children ages 18 months to three-years-old. We strive to provide a developmentally appropriate early childhood experience that allows each child to grow emotionally, cognitively, socially, spiritually and physically in a loving atmosphere. tard Seed is a busy, happy, and creative place where young children are encouraged to explore and actively engage all of their senses. Children will be ex-





posed daily to the word of God, nature, science, math, literacy, music and movement.

YOUTH MINISTRY

2024 is already upon us, and I wish you all a happy New Year from the St. Luke's youth group! Throughout 2023 the youth of St. Luke's truly answered our calling from Christ through fellowship, service, and truly loving our fellow parishioners and neighbors as ourselves. December of 2023 was no different. The youth ended the year strong with our traditional Christmas party.

On Wednesdays in Advent youth participated in a new class that allowed them to explore the history and tradition of Christmas carols. This new class culminated in the return of a beloved St. Luke's tradition of caroling. Members of our congregation of all ages visited the homes of several of our fellow parishioners to spread holiday cheer. With January well underway, we are keeping the momentum going both in our regular Sunday gatherings, and in new offerings for the youth of the parish.

If you are hoping to start the new year by supporting one of our many ministries, the youth group is welcoming to all and deeply appreciate the support of the members of St. Luke's. Whether it's volunteering as a second adult, providing meals on Sunday's, or helping connect the youth with nonprofits or service opportunities, we welcome you and please reach out to Bryan at any time.

Sunday Classes

Sunday evening sessions will continue to see the middle and high schoolers meet separately, with a shared dinner in between. Both sessions will have a new series that will allow the youth to explore their faith and further develop their own spiritual identities. The middle school will begin the series "The Life of Jesus" which will see our members delve into the four Gospels, and how they present the story of the life of Jesus. We will see how the different Gospels compare and contrast in their depictions of the development of Jesus' ministry, and to kick us off we will begin with the Nativity stories as told by Luke and Matthew.

Our high schoolers will begin an exploration of "Side Characters of the Bible", a new series which looks at those individuals who are mentioned in scripture only once or twice, yet have a tremendous impact on the ministry of Jesus and our own relation to the scriptures. From the Samaritan woman at the well, to Joseph of Arimathea, the youth will investigate both how they are depicted in the scriptures, and how their stories evolved and grew with the ever changing nature of Church history.

Catechism/Confirmation Classes

With the announcement of Bishop David Read's visit to St. Luke's on April 7, we will see the first group of fellow parishioners confirmed by our new Bishop. As we prepare for the Bishop's arrival, one of the most important parts of youth ministry will begin on January 14th, the catechism/confirmation classes. Catechism class is open to all youth and will run for 12 weeks during the 10:00am formation hour.

During these 12 weeks the youth will have a chance to explore and discover what the Episcopal Church is, why we do what we do, and what it means to be a part of the body of Christ. This class will also serve as the confirmation class for those who are eligible and wish to be confirmed during Bishop Read's visit. Confirmation is open to all baptized youth who are in 8th grade or above. Being confirmed in the Church is a monumental event in the life of many parishioners, and is a time to both reaffirm our faith in God, and fully integrate as a member of St. Luke's. Service & Outreach

Also beginning in January and continuing throughout the year, the youth will organize several clothes drives for the Holding Institute of Laredo, a local nonprofit who we worked with during our mission trip, which serves the migrant community at the border, so that we may return at a future date and continue to support this vital ministry.

Lenten Series & Shrove Tuesday Pancake Dinner

The time of Lent will soon be upon us, and during this time of reflection and contemplation we will see the return of the Wednesday night Lenten programming. This year's programming however, will be very different to years past. St. Luke's alongside our fellow Episcopal Churches St. Paul's, St. David's, and St. Margaret's will come together and have a rotating Lenten series. Each Wednesday evening one of these Churches will host both dinner and a lesson based on scripture from the Book of Acts. Members of St. Luke's are encouraged to travel and visit these communities each week as we come together as a true Episcopal community. 


