LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

Thad the great privilege of spending a weekend last month at St. Mark's Church in Beaumont, where I got to be their guest preacher on Sunday morning.

Right after graduating from seminary, I was assigned to be a curate at St. Mark's. (Not sure what a "curate" is? See the article on pg. 5.) I left St. Mark's in 2001 to become rector of a church in Houston. I visited once in 2006, but otherwise I haven't been back since.

One of the fun aspects of my visit in April was the chance to reconnect with old friends – the organist with whom I served is now retired, but he came back to church that day so that he could see me. And I enjoyed having lunch with a couple whose wedding was just my second wedding to officiate. The Senior Warden is a young woman who was in high school when I was there. So, our visit was a great opportunity to reminisce.

But another fun aspect was seeing all the people who have joined St. Mark's since 2001. A lot can change in a congregation in 23 years, so most people there had no idea who I was.

My visit was a powerful reminder of how a community evolves over time. It's no different here at St. Luke's. You might think of yourself. Were you here in 2001? If so, think about all the changes you've seen over the past couple of decades. Have you joined since 2001? You might think of all the

history that preceded you, and you might remember that just as people welcomed you as a newcomer, you now get the chance to welcome people to your church home.

We'll have our own transitions this summer, as we bid farewell to Rebecca Koch, our contemporary music leader for the 9:00 am service, and to the Rev. Reagan Gonzalez, our Associate Rector. We'll also get to welcome Tanner Ambs and his family, and the School is looking forward to welcoming Mike Jenkins in July as its new Head of School.

As much as I enjoyed my visit to Beaumont, I sure was glad to return to San Antonio and to St. Luke's. I give thanks for my place here, and I give thanks for the chance to share life with you here on the Hilltop. We may not know what St. Luke's will be like years in the future, but we can be confident that the Holy Spirit will still be present, seeking to guide the church community as it strives to be faithful to God's will.

Her last Sunday will be May 19: as we celebrate that day the Feast of Pentecost, we'll also get to celebrate the many blessings we've enjoyed during our time with her as a part of the St. Luke's Church community.

Rev. Reagan will be hard to replace, but the Rev. Irv Cutter has begun the search for another priest to join the church staff. Thank you, Reagan, for all that you have offered during your time with us! We pray for abundant blessings for you as you step into your new role.

WELCOME TO OUR NEW CURATE

On July 1, the Rev. Tanner Ambs will join us as our curate, beginning a two-year assignment at St. Luke's Church.

In the Episcopal Church, we usually use the word "curate" to refer to a newly ordained person, just out of seminary, who does an internship at a church to learn about parish ministry. Tanner has just graduated from the Seminary of the Southwest in Austin and is excited about coming to St. Luke's.

When he starts, Tanner will be a transitional deacon. Our view of ministry recognizes four orders of ministry – laity, deacons, priests, and bishops – and we have a "sequential" understanding of ordination; in effect, before someone is ordained a priest, they are first ordained a deacon. So, Tanner anticipates being ordained a deacon in June, and we hope that perhaps in December he will be ordained a priest.

As a deacon, Tanner will have certain roles in the Sunday liturgy, so we'll look forward to see-

ing him involved in Sunday services and preaching as soon as he arrives. After his priestly ordination, he'll be able to preside at the Eucharist and officiate at weddings and funerals and handle other priestly roles.

During his two years at St. Luke's, our plan is to give him a close-up look at various aspects of parish life, including pastoral visits, working with newcomers, teaching classes, seeing how the vestry works, understanding financial reports. At the end of his two-year assignments, we'll hope Tanner is well prepared for his next call, perhaps becoming priest-in-charge of another congregation.

Tanner grew up in Amarillo, where most of his family still lives, and lived there until he graduated from West Texas A&M University with a bachelor's degree in psychology. He was a choir kid all through high school. Tanner worked at nondenominational churches in youth ministries throughout college. He moved to the San Antonio area immediately following graduation and worked for seven years in mental healthcare as a community case manager. He and Allie were married in 2017 after being introduced by one of Tanner's coworkers.

Before starting seminary, Tanner and Allie were members of St. Margaret's Church, San Antonio. Allie grew up in San Antonio and has family here, so they're delighted to return here after three years of seminary in Austin. They have a 10-monthold child, Lorelei, and they've enjoyed learning about the thriving children's ministries that St. Luke's offers.

Come to church on Sunday, July 7, and help welcome the Ambs family to St. Luke's!


Students vs. Parents Bible Jeopardy


TEEN AND ADULT VOLUNTEERS - Rising 6th graders and up!

MUSIC AT ST. LUKE'S

Most of the heavy lifting this season is now done. We celebrated wonderful and meaningful services during Holy Week and Easter, and we have one final concert to round out this season.

Our Celebrity Organ Concert will be given on May 5 (*Cinco de Mayo*) at 3:00 pm by Jeremiah Stephenson. He is organist at the famous church of All Saints', Margaret Street, London, and is a distinguished artist on the European Continent as well as having toured the US a couple of years ago. This is a free concert and we invite you to enjoy a thrilling program, and meet the artist at a special reception following. Introduce a friend to St. Luke's and our Music Program.

During the summer we will be updating the organ combination action with the latest software and well as refining some of the voicing.

Then I will be making a new recording for Raven CD, *Organ Contrasts*, which will be released in the fall.

We already have the New Concert Series lined up for 2024-2025, though two dates aren't yet totally inscribed in stone.

As often happens there will likely by additional opportunities that arise during the season, and we will keep you informed of those.

During the summer of 2025, we will be making a new Choir CD: *True Light*. This will reflect different genres of music, namely Gospel and Soul, with a few surprises. Featuring Duke Ellington, Keith Hampton, Moses Hogan, Edwin Hawkins.

And looking even further ahead, we will be Choir-in-Residence at Durham Cathedral, UK, singing from July 19-25 (2027) at the Eighth Wonder of the World. It gets no better than this!

OCTOBER 27, 7:00PM – Silent Movie Night

A repeat of the *Phantom of the Opera*, due to high demand. Next year we will feature the Hunchback of Notre Dame.

DECEMBER 8, 3:00PM - Handel's Messiah

The Choir of St. Luke's with Soloists performs this much-loved Christmas staple. We will be accompanied by a chamber orchestra for this performance.

MARCH 30, 3:00PM - Mozart's Requiem

One of the most poignant and dignified pieces of choral music ever written; Mozart lay dying as he wrote it. Performed by St. Luke's Choir and Soloists.

APRIL 27, 3:00PM – Organ Concert

Richard Pinel was a chorister of mine back in the 90s! Since then he has toured the world. He was organist at Perth Cathedral, Australia, and St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle, Music Director at Jesus College, Cambridge, and teaches at the Royal Academy of Music.

ST. FRANCIS GUILD

The mission of the St. Francis Guild is to join with members of St. Luke's to serve Christ to the glory of God by decorating the church for Christmas and Easter celebrations, sponsoring a Palm Cross Workshop, and providing fellowship among members.

We also get together once a month to make Chrismons. A Chrismon is a monogram of Christ (chris-mon) and a symbol of the Christian faith. Symbols are various crosses, angels, butterflies, hearts, fish, dove, shells, and the Chi Rho. Chrismons are constructed of white felt and decorated with silver, white, or gold sequins, lace, beads, pearls, etc. Each member uses their own ideas and creativity in designing and decorating the symbols. When finished, another member then backs the ornaments and attaches ribbons for hanging and tags explaining the symbols.

Chrismon crosses are presented to those who are baptized, and during Easter, Chrismon butter-

flies are given to church members who are home bound. We also offer them for sale on Sundays during Advent and on Mothers' Day with the proceeds going to the church. Chrismons are offered for sale to St. Luke's School parents and grandparents at their school programs. Monies raised are then given to the school.

This article is an appeal for help in making Chrismons. No experience necessary! We supply the materials, patterns, and teach you how to make them! It is needlework handwork and can be done while watching TV, waiting in offices for appointments, sitting on an airplane: anywhere, anytime! Strangers may ask you what you are doing and you can explain what a Chrismon is and thus spread God's love. Serving our Neighbors: Mission SA

We are happy to announce that the SLEC San Antonio week of mission will be held Sunday, July 21 through Saturday, July 27.

This local mission will look different from traditional mission trips. We will begin the week with an overnight lock-in at the Church. Then, throughout the week youth will gather at St. Luke's for breakfast before setting out for planned events each day. We will finish each day with a shared meal and time for fellowship before the youth are picked up. To cap off this week of service, we plan to end with a lock-in Friday night and have Saturday serve as a fun day for the youth in thanks for their work. The three goals of this mission are:

- 1) Education: Ensuring that those participating gain a deeper understanding of the current state of immigration we as a border diocese and as a nation are facing. We will also explore the history of immigration both in Texas and the nation, and the role the Episcopal church has played in immigration ministry.
- 2) Fieldwork: Participants each day will go out and serve at various nonprofits and organizations throughout the city that are focused on helping those who are currently going through the immigration process.
- 3) Parish Involvement: While this is a predominantly a youth mission experience, one of my greatest hopes is that we will engage non youth members of our parish by hosting talks and presentations at St. Luke's and have meaningful intergenerational engagement that strengthens our parish in answering our call from Christ to serve all those around us.

Capital Campaign Update

St. Luke's Church is Debt-Free

At the beginning of 2021, our congregation embarked on a three-year capital campaign: "Transformation and Celebration", an effort to make significant improvements to our campus. After getting input from parishioners, the Vestry committed to a campaign with five goals:

- Acquire a new pipe organ.
- Tend to the stained glass in the nave.
- Address the church's aging infrastructure.
- Tend to our exterior spaces.
- Update the Parlors.

We engaged the Reuter Organ Company, and the new pipe organ was completed in late 2022. Cavallini Glass Company refurbished and restored our windows in summer 2022. Some components of our aging HVAC system have been replaced, and we are currently replacing the cooling tower that services the DiRaddo Building, a project that we hope will be completed this summer.

We are working with the Rialto Studio to develop a master landscaping plan that can guide us in the future as we address accessibility issues and try to make the best use of exterior spaces like the South Lawn. Finally, we hope at some point to come up with a plan to refresh the Parlors and the kitchenette and restrooms that are nearby.

At the beginning of the campaign, we invited people to fulfill campaign pledges over three years. We knew we would need to cover expenses before those pledge contributions came in. So, the church borrowed money from our Permanent Endowment Trust (PET). This financing arrangement was critical to the success of the campaign.

Three years later, we can celebrate that we had almost 100% of pledgers fulfill their commitments. Because of the generous hearts of people who were inspired to support the campaign, we had enough funds to accomplish the first three goals, and we have funds to make good progress on the last two goals. And in April, the church paid off its obligation to the PET.

This is a significant development. In the past, PET Trustees have lent money to the church and later had to forgive the debt because the church wasn't in a strong enough position to repay the loan. Our ability to repay the PET in this case demonstrates our current vitality.

We can give thanks for everyone who supported the campaign. A few gifts were especially critical:


- A lead gift from **Art Bayern** to get us well-positioned to acquire the new pipe organ.

- An additional gift from the Guenthers, which helped put us in a position to repay the note to the PET.


