LETTER FROM THE RECTOR

Dear Friends,

The Vestry and I are so excited about an intitative that we're introducing to the congregation in September.

Saint Luke's is joining other Episcopal churches nationwide who have participated in taking a comprehensive survey of spiritual life that can help provide valuable information to the Parish on our faith journey as a congregation. The inventory was created by **RenewalWorks**, an Episcopal organization charged with advancing spiritual growth, and is intended to be though-provoking for your own faith journey.

Regardless of where you are on your faith journey — satisfied or seeking a new direction — we want to hear from all adult members of your household. Your results will be completely anonymous and confidential. We'll share the link with you in September.

We suggest that you set aside about 20-30 minutes to complete the inventory. We recognize that your time is valuable and it is important to note that once you start the inventory you must complete it - it is not possible to take part of the inventory and resume at later time. Due to the subject matter, it is intended to be completed in one sitting, to allow you to reflect on your faith in important ways.

All completed online inventories will be automatically tabulated by RenewalWorks. If you are

unable to complete the inventory online, provisions have been made with the church office to use one of their computers or to complete a confidential hard copy version. Please contact Sara Spreen for information.

After the results are tabulated, a team of parishioners will go through a process over the next few months looking at the results and interpreting them. They then will make recommendations to the Vestry based on their work. I'm hoping that their insights will help us understand what resources the church can provide to parishioners to help them on their path to spiritual maturity.

The RenewalWorks program has been so beneficial to churches that have used it. I believe it has great potential to help us understand where God is leading us in the future. I appreciate your willingness to participate, and I look forward to sharing this process with you in the coming days.

The Rev. Tanner Ambs


I am so glad to be here with all of you at St. Luke's. The welcome that I have received over the past month and a half has been nothing short of incredible, and I am truly thankful for this parish. There is nothing quite like being in a new church and learning about the parish and its history. Whether you have been here since the beginning or are new like me, I would love to hear all about your experience of St. Luke's and what the parish means to you. I am always open for a chat, or a leisurely game of chess (the board is already set up in my office).

I have spent my first month settling into my office and learning my way around the parish and the school. I feel like I am beginning to grasp some of the rhythms of life in and around St. Luke's. Now that everything is sort of settled, I am ready to jump into fall here on the Hilltop. (Am I saying that right?) Part of the settling in process is working with Fr. Irv on what my focuses will be during my curacy at St. Luke's.

Two of my areas of ministry focus that I will be working closely with during my time here will be in Adult Formation and College and Young Adult ministry offerings. I am really looking forward to joining with the leaders that are already involved in those areas, some of whom I have already met with and some whom I have yet to meet. For the fall, as far as Adult Formation goes, we will have three offerings this year for the Sunday Formation hour. We will have an Inquirer's Class, for those new to St. Luke's or simply wanting to learn more about the Episcopal Church. Topics include church history, governance, worship, theology, and more. There will also be a bible study, with more information on that to come, so be on the lookout.

An intergenerational book study for adults and youth will begin Sunday, September 8. We will be reading *The Practice of the Presence of God* by Brother Lawrence, a Carmelite monk.

I am excited to be with all of you! And I cannot wait to see what God does in our lives and in this parish!

THE MINISTRY OF PASTORAL CARE

It's good when members of a family care for one another, looking out for each other and offering support in times of need. That's true in the Christian household, too. As fellow members of the St. Luke's congregation, the support we offer to each other as we meet life's challenges can be a holy source of strength and comfort.

Pastoral care ministries take many forms at St. Luke's and include:

Clergy visits. The art of pastoral care is an important part of the formation process for all people in ordained ministry. Clergy often have the privilege of being "first responders" for people facing challenging situations. When a parishioner is in the hospital or facing a challenging situation, we hope they will call the church, so that clergy can offer support, which can include prayers, pastoral guidance, and hospital visits.

Eucharistic visits. Several members of St. Luke's are licensed as Eucharistic Visitors. Their ministry is to people who can't come to church but want to receive the Sacrament that we share during Sunday worship services. If you can't come to church regularly and would appreciate receiving Communion at home, please reach out to parishioner Lindsay Hart at loveymarv53@hotmail.com.

The Community of Hope. St. Luke's has commissioned seven Lay Chaplains trained to serve in all forms of pastoral care. Pastoral care is when a person is "present" in a listening, compassionate, non-controlling manner to an individual or group for the purpose of representing God to them and seeking to respond to their spiritual needs. Through spiritual formation, practical lessons and the support, encouragement and insights of our members, lay chaplains deepen the roots of a caring community. So far this year, members of the Community of Hope have made 111 planned visits and had 171 pastoral encounters!


The St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Guild. This group began its ministry a couple of years ago, taking on the mission of writing letters to people who are mourning the death of a loved one. Formerly known simply as "the bereavement ministry", they chartered themselves this summer as a guild, choosing to name themselves after St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, considered by many as the patron saint of those who grieve.

Prayers for healing. The ministry of prayer is a powerful offering of pastoral care. Each Sunday we print names in the worship bulletins and invite the congregation to remember those people in their own prayers. Additionally, the Daughters of the King and the Brotherhood of St. Andrew commit to pray reg-

ularly for people who request those prayers. And on Sunday evenings, a priest is always available to pray one-on-one with anyone who desires it at the conclusion of the 6:00 pm service. We're currently looking at additional ways that the church can offer support to those who desire prayers.

We want St. Luke's to be well-positioned to care for the pastoral needs of parishioners. Several ideas for new ministries are floating around, including the possibility of a prayer shawl group that would make shawls for people in need of prayer. More than ever, as a church we are feeling the buzz of families who are always eager to see each other and continue to develop long lasting friendships in our community of faith.

As the Director of Children & Family Ministries, my role is to direct ministries under the umbrella of our committed and enthusiastic Children and Family Ministries Committee. Collectively we are mindful of always coming back to our intent and shared expectations. As we discussed plans for this fall, we have focused on what will build sustainable, faith-based relationships with God, each other, and our neighbors in our wider community. We value your prayers and involvement if this is a season for you to be involved.

Children & Family Ministries Team

The goal of the Children & Family Ministries Team is to help children and families deepen their relationship with God and each other, learn about the love and grace of Jesus Christ, and know they are valued members of our faith community.

Responsibilities:

KINDERGARTEN - 1ST GRADE: GODLY PLAY - TIME TO WONDER

Godly Play is a Montessori style of telling Bible stories, parables, and liturgical action about religious traditions using simple, natural materials. It invites the listener to connect faith stories with personal experience through wondering questions and open-ended responses.

1ST GRADE AND UP! - HOLY COMMUNION CLASS



Through hands-on experiences in the classroom and sanctuary, children learn what we do in worship and why we do it. This class is especially geared to first graders, but older elementary children who have not yet participated are welcome as well. Registration Required.



2ND - 3RD GRADE: GODLY PLAY - GOING DEEPER

Godly Play with a focus is on important characters of the bible. Children are invited to connect faith stories with personal experience through wondering questions and openended responses.

PARISHIONER PROFILE: Griffin Kissling

Interesting, huh?

Interesting the way things come together to give direction for future actions. Ask Griffin Kissling, the stalwart of the worship music group at St. Luke's 9:00 am Sunday service.

A native San Antonian, Griffin's future was set when his Catholic father and his Baptist mother came together in the conclusion that the Episcopal church was where they should be, making Griffin pretty much a lifelong Episcopalian.

Then, Griffin and his wife *Emily* a while back got a telephone call from Daniel Kittrell and his wife *Emily* explaining they were in the St. Luke's 9:00 am worship music group and wouldn't Griffin like to join them? They came together some seven years ago. The Kittrells have moved on and now Griffin is the 9:00 am lead guy.

And along the way he was elected and is now into the second of his threeyear term on the St. Luke's vestry. A graduate of Alamo Heights High School, Griffin went off to Austin to earn his bachelor's degree in economics and business administration at the University of Texas.

Back home in San Antonio Griffin accepted a position as a project manager with a major construction company because, "I needed money to buy a ring for Emily." They now have Foster (3 years) and Warren (9 months). After the construction job

Griffin signed on with San Antonio's Jefferson Bank a year ago where he is a commercial credit underwriter. He says this is what he always wanted to do.

Griffin plays the guitar and the drums. He says he tries to practice the guitar every evening after picking up the instrument at age 13. And it was during his college days when he began to get into worship music. Apparently the drums have left the biggest impression, as after a recent 9:00 a.m. service, his son Foster was seen (*heard*) playing his father's drums.

Emily too is an Alamo Heights High School graduate. However, she went to Texas A&M for a bachelor's degree in psychology and a master's in special education. Here is one more of those things coming together although this is more difficult to fully explain considering the two universities involved.

Somewhere among those times Emily and Griffin met while on the staff for a family event at the Mustang Island Conference Center. Griffin says it is probably good they didn't know each other in high school as he was working out some things.

Looking over his time at St. Luke's Griffin says it's "cool" to see new, younger families coming to church bringing their different personalities.

And how about this? Griffin has been a rock star. In high school he played in a garage band. In Austin he was in the group Aquadillo. Back in San Antonio he and a group were called Lionfish. "We played rock music, really loud rock music." Those things coming together can be explained.

The groups are on hiatus, but Griffin says some of Lionfish's recordings are streaming on Spotify, Apple Music and other platforms. Aquadillo can be found on YouTube-- if you search long enough.

MUSIC AT ST. LUKE'S Russell Jackson, Director and Organist

I'm looking forward to a new year beginning in September when we'll feature some new works as well as the great seasonal standbys. We'll promote several important composers who have anniversaries during the term, including: Anton Bruckner, Gabriel Fauré, Gustav Holst, Camille Saint-Saëns, Charles Villiers Stanford, and David Willcocks, to name a few.

I've also scheduled two major works of Benjamin Britten: three movements from his *Ceremony of Carols* on Christmas Eve, and his large-scale anthem *Rejoice in the Lamb* for our final Evensong. The text of *Rejoice* is by Christopher Smart, a renowned poet and inmate of Northampton Lunatic Asylum; he was known to sit in the portico of All Saints' Church and write his visionary poetry. All information about musical happenings at St. Luke's can be found in the Music List (hardcopies in the Narthex) or online at www.slecsa.org/music.

Throughout the year we'll be preparing for a new recording: *True Light*. The Anglican choral tradition draws on many genres, having its ancestral roots in Plainsong and the first Great Hymns of the Church. It has developed through polyphony to the English Golden Age when Henry VIII dictated what would be acceptable in his Church, and as this developed through the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, we recognized that the continent still had much to offer even if not written specifically for the Anglican Church. The Episcopal Church also observed the wonderful influences of different traditions and denominations which it gladly embraced. Composers like Duke Ellington, Keith Hampton, Moses Hogan, Randall Thompson... who we will feature on this recording.

The recording is a precursor to our next choir tour when we'll be singing at Durham Cathedral in the northeast of England in 2027. Durham was my home county, and this was my diocesan cathedral. I have never taken a choir to Durham, so it seems fit to make this a stop on our tour. Durham Cathedral is often, and rightly, called the Eighth Wonder of the World.

Though Ripon may be the oldest foundation from the seventh century predating Canterbury, Durham is one of the oldest buildings in Christianity. The cathedral is an enormous Romanesque building from the tenth century and is intact. It also houses two very important saints: Bede in the Gali-



lee Chapel perched high above the River Wear, and Cuthbert whose intact corpse rests behind the high altar.

Farthest east is the Chapel of the Nine Altars which are laid from north to south across the east wall. The (Prince) Bishop has the highest throne in Christendom, standing above the south choir aisle. Durham is a place of superlatives, not just the cathedral but the city (built on seven hills like Rome), the university which is housed across the cathedral green in Durham Castle, the place of the Norman Conquest and Hadrian's Wall, and was designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1987 along with the Taj Mahal and the Palace of Versailles.

Our Concert Series has four "home games" plus we welcome the Texas Children's Choir closer to Christmas, and the all-male choral group IlluMen next spring. I do hope you'll come to experience and enjoy our offerings; they're intended as a gift and to inspire you, and perhaps make the world a better place in the process.

YOUTH MINISTRY



these summer outings, the youth group continued to meet regularly for our Sunday evening session with combined middle & high school. One of the greatest celebrations for the youth was our return to the newly renovated Youth Room. Over the course of these many weeks we've had a chance to explore the hobbies of many of our fellow parishioners, and gain a deeper appreciation for what these hobbies mean to them both on a spiritual and personal level. I offer my deepest thanks to all our presenters for their wonderful work and for sharing such a meaningful part of themselves with the parish.

The end of July saw one of the largest undertakings by the youth group in many years as we met with Christ to answer his call to serve our neighbors with Mission SA. This week of mission right here in our own city saw the youth of our parish engage in work supporting the Immigration Ministries of our diocese and doing our part in providing assistance and a place of rest to those who have recently arrived in our nation.

Joining us during this mission week were youth members from St. Mark's and Church of Reconciliation, who were invited to ensure that we could share in the work in which DWTX is engaged.



The youth of these parishes made several visits to Plaza de Paz, the migrant respite center led by our diocese and engaged in work including preparing and serving over 230 meals, creating meal kits and prayer squares to be distributed to those continuing their journeys outside of the state, assisting with intake and travel processing for those at the center, and being present in this community.

In addition to the active work on the ground, a key component of the mission week was to encourage ongoing education not only for our youth, but all members of St. Luke's into the realities of our nation's migrant crisis. Over the course of the week St. Luke's hosted several guest speakers including representatives from our own immigration ministries and the Center for Refugee Services, as well as a visit to the historic San Juan Mission farm to better understand the history of migration to our city and how the San Antonio Food Bank is stepping up to provide food aid to the people of San Antonio. I could not be prouder of the youth of St. Luke's and I offer my deepest and most heartfelt thanks to the youth, parents, presenters, volunteers, and parishioners who helped make this week of mission a truly wonderful success. One can see clearly Jesus is at work with many of our youth, and we look forward to providing opportunities in the near future to share more about our experiences with the parish.



Fall Classes & Schedule

Beginning August 18, our Sunday evening sessions will return to split middle and high school classes with a shared dinner in between. Both the middle and high school classes will see us carrying forward some of the lessons from our mission week, and continue to explore both the ways we can continue serving in San Antonio and why we are called to serve by Christ.

The fall season will also see the return of the high schooler off campus dinners the first Sunday's of each month. Beginning September 8, our high schoolers will venture off campus as we explore the neighborhood alongside fellowship. To ensure our middle schoolers are not left out, there will be several opportunities for the middle schoolers to also have off campus dinners later in the fall.

Continuing to be intergenerational, the Sunday morning formation will see youth and adults combine for a book study led by our new Curate, the Rev. Tanner Ambs, and myself. This series will begin Sunday September 8, and for this series we will be reading *The Practice of the Presence of God* by Brother Lawrence, a Carmelite monk.

Earlier this year, a water leak under the Parish Hall kitchen led to significant damage to the floors, walls, and furnishings in the Youth Room. We used the funds from the insurance claim, along with some donations from a couple of generous parishioners, to give the whole suite an upgrade.

The first week of July saw the youth host our first evening sessions in the newly renovated Youth Room, and our youth could not be more ecstatic for this new space. With brand new flooring, an expanded kitchen, and dedicated dining space, the youth group has been hard at work both enjoying and decorating the space.

To mark this major renovation to this sacred space, we invite all members of the parish to visit the youth room during **Rally Day**, August 25. Come on down and see the largest changes to the Youth Room in decades and what has quickly become an even more beloved space by our youth.

As we prepare for the arrival of the fall season, we remind everyone that all 6–12th grade youth are welcome to any of our youth group offerings, and that we strive to make our youth group a place of acceptance and respect. MUSTARD SEED

Things have been quiet at The Mustard Seed since school ended in mid-May. In the last few weeks, I have been busy preparing for a new school year. We will see both new and returning families here at The Mustard Seed. Three of our teachers are returning for another year, and we are welcoming one new teacher in the Angel's Room.

Ms. Maria and Ms. Sarine will once again teach our youngest students in the Shepherd's Room. Ms. Maggie will be joined by Ms. Mercedes in the Angel's Room with our older students. Our teachers will return to campus on August 5th for a week of preparation and professional development which will include Pediatric and Adult First Aid and CPR.

We will start the year with a Parent Meeting on August 12. This is a time for new and returning Mustard Seed families to meet one another, hear about the plans for the school year, and meet their children's teachers. Our students will come the next morning for Meet the Teacher. This is an exciting day when we get to see familiar faces and meet new friends.

The first couple of weeks of school are always an adjustment for our students whether they have attended school previously or not. Our teachers encourage and support their students and help them to feel loved and welcome. Some children race into the classroom and immediately start playing while others are more cautious and nervous. We do our best to meet each student where they are. After a few short weeks, all the back-to-school jitters will be gone.

This year, we will introduce Zoo Phonics into both of our classrooms. This is a fun way for children to be exposed to the alphabet and learn the sounds that each letter makes. Zoo Phonics uses picture cards which show the letter and an animal, along with a catchy saying, and body movements to teach letter sounds. Lower case letters are taught first since these are the letters that make up most print materials.

The whole alphabet is reviewed daily rather than teaching one letter per week. Repetition and body movement is a more engaging way to learn letter recognition and sounds. My goal is to introduce our students to a fun way to see and hear the alphabet. I do not expect our students to master the alphabet, especially our youngest learners, but this is a fun way to expose them to it. I want to make learning exciting and engaging, and to prepare our students for PreK-3.




